Happy New Year! I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas season, and have started the New Year with good health, cheer, and loved ones near.

On the last Sunday of the year, I challenged all of you to imagine rituals you might take on in the new year, instead of resolutions. Rituals help create the patterns of our lives - they're like habits, in a way, except unlike habits, we put intention and a certain mindful quality into our rituals. For myself, one small ritual I have added to my life in the new year is sitting and drinking my tea in the morning quiet. I don't rush around; I don't take it 'to-go'; I don't put on a podcast or music. I prepare the cup of tea with close attention to what I am doing; I let it cool and while it cools I let my mind wander. I drink it slowly, and I wash my cup when I'm done. A few mornings a week, I do a short meditative practice while my tea cools instead of just letting my mind wander. The whole thing takes maybe twenty minutes - I can nearly always find twenty minutes in my morning! And it sets me up for a day that began in a calm centered place. I hope that you are able to either turn a regular routine into a ritual, or to create a small ritual that gives you peace and a moment of intention in your day!

If you've looked at a calendar, you may have noticed that Lent begins early this year! The Season of Lent is a moveable season - it's always the same length, but the start date varies widely. The start of Lent is determined by counting backwards from Easter - and the date for Easter is the first full moon on or after the spring equinox. That date, this year, is Sunday March 31, which means we will celebrate Ash Wednesday on February 14. This year, we are keeping Lent with Christ Lutheran Church. Last year, we worshiped with them on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and at the Easter Vigil. This year, they'll host Ash Wednesday at noon, and we'll host at 6. We'll gather for a mid-week Lenten conversation, hosted Wednesdays here at Westminster (time TBD). And we'll worship together for Holy Week as well - Christ Lutheran will host Maundy Thursday and the Easter Vigil; we'll host Good Friday. This is a wonderful opportunity to spend time with a congregation much like ours - they are small and tend to be an older congregation, but more importantly, they too are deeply concerned with social justice and mission. I hope you will join us for worship and for conversation as we strengthen our relationship with our siblings-in-Christ from Christ Lutheran!

A Holiday Update on the Ibrahimis!

I have been visiting part of my family in the east for several years now at Christmas. I realized that our Afghan family who had relocated to Baltimore this past summer, the Ibrahimis, only lived a 2 hour drive from my sister's home in Pennsylvania. They were absolutely delighted when I mentioned that I would consider coming to see them in their new apartment if the timing worked out. My sister was excited to meet them also, so we arranged to drive down after Christmas. It was a rainy, dismal day, but we had no trouble finding their home. Greeted with hugs around and smiles galore, their first question when we had out coats off was, "Are you staying for the night?" Lori and I were both shocked and just laughed.

We had a very warm and amazing time being hosted in their home in the traditional Afghani way. Tea and nuts to begin with, bread being made as we drove, and a full course meal to share after an hour of talking. I took a grocery bag of fresh veggies and fruits to share with them. Even Sarajuddin, the father, came home from work to spend time with us. All of the kids are speaking quite good English at this point and thoroughly engaged in



school. The youngest, Zuhal, didn't talk while we were there, being shy at 2, but Gul Shah told me that she only speaks English at home now and no Dari! Sema showed me her report card from the 2nd marking



period, showing off all A's and B's in a regular 9th grade curriculum. I was so proud of her. Bashir had a good report card too, with a mixture of grades. He's doing well also, but could do better in one subject if he didn't "chat so much" according to the report card comment. He didn't know what that meant, so my sister and I made sure that he understood that word and told him we knew he could do better!

Gul Shah, especially, was so thrilled to see us as she has not made friends while being there so far. The children all have friends from school and in the Afghan community. Saraj is driving for Uber and they seem to be doing well. Their apartment is much nicer (and less expensive) than the one they had here in Santa Fe. That was good to see. They also live only a 5 minute walk from a nearby park, which they visit frequently when the weather is nicer.

I am so glad that we made the trip and they were absolutely thrilled that we came. A real blessing from the holidays!

Holistic Ministry in Madagascar: Evangelism, Food Security, Creation Care and Health

12:30pm Sunday January 21, at First Presbyterian

All are invited to a lunch and program with Dan Turk, Mission Co-worker of the Presbyterian Church (USA) assigned to Madagascar working with the Fruits, Vegetables, and Environmental Education Program of the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar. Dan will speak at the 8:30am service at First Presbyterian Church and introduce himself with a "minute for mission" at the 11:00am service at Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Dan Turk has spent nearly 30 years working in Madagascar-an island nation that has some of the greatest biodiversity in the world but also one of the highest levels of poverty. For the past 26 years as a Mission Co-worker of the Presbyterian Church (USA), Dan has served in partnership with the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar (FKJM), working with their Fruits, Vegetables, and Environmental Education Program (FVEE). The FVEE provides internships for university students and training for seminary students, church pastors and members, and farmers who learn to grow and graft fruit trees to improve their food security and income. He and his Malagasy colleagues in the FVEE also propagate native trees of exceptional educational value both for sale to expand their programs and for planting at schools, churches, and other public places to increase appreciation of Madagascar's rich biodiversity. An avid botanist, he founded the Ranomafana Arboretum in 2007 and has named three new species of trees.

Dan and his wife Elizabeth are members of Decatur Presbyterian Church in Georgia. We are delighted to welcome them to Santa Fe!
